


Post during reading, during the lesson, or post on a word wall to assist students with writing.




Book: Your Voice is Your Superpower!

1 piece of 12 x 12 scrapbook paper per student


Directions

- 1. Read the book with the students, discussing how each page focuses on freedom.
- 2. Ask students to think about the story, *Your Voice is Your Superpower!* What does freedom of speech mean to you?
- 3. Brainstorm some ideas and make a list on the board of ways students have freedom of speech.
- 4. Using the scrapbook paper as a quilt square, add pictures, quotes, and facts to represent your voice. What are you free to do? Use examples from the book to help students get ideas of things they are free to do.
- 5. Have students share their quilt square with the class.
- 6. Connect all the quilt squares together. Hole punch each square and tie together with yarn. Hang the freedom quilt in the classroom.


Create Your Own Superhero Cape!


